Thoughts from Pastor Jeff

What is the Spiritual Life- a Garden?

It's almost time to put the garden together again. We have a little raised bed about twenty feet by three feet along the east side of our backyard. We grow lettuce and tomatoes, peppers and spinach, and last year had a nice crop of carrots. To tell you the truth, I'm always a little late with this task. For the past several years I've had to borrow a tiller from a friend to loosen up the ground after winter's hard freezing and settling. I'm always a little reluctant to ask if I can borrow it again, so I put it off until the last possible minute before the seeds have to go in the ground. I suppose I could just buy my own tiller to solve that problem. Another reason planting gets delayed is because spring is such a busy season with soccer and other chores around the house screaming to be tended to. After

another day ends and I look out on that patch of empty dirt I think, "I'll get to it soon."

I've heard that the spiritual life is like a garden. The Bible is full of imagery fit for farmers (even backyard farmers). Water and seeds and good soil make for rich spiritual analogy. I've even been asked by well-meaning spiritual leaders to imagine my spiritual life as a garden. "If your spiritual life were a garden, what would it look like? Would it be well-watered? Would it be green and flourishing?" To tell you the truth, the analogy doesn't often sit well with me. In the church, we do well at lifting up good produce. We are quick to talk about all the good fruit of the spirit but too often misrepresent the hard, messy work it takes to develop it. In the glow of rising shoots and blooming flowers we forget the long cold winter of looking out at empty patches of dirt.

And we rarely consider the leave-it-alone time when the bacteria and the worms in the soil do their necessary work.

I've come to understand that what we perceive as emptiness, this apparent barrenness, is the spiritual life just as much as the fruitfulness.

Even as we wonder at spring, as the grass turns from brown to green, the buds pop from the branches and shoots rise from bulbs beneath the ground, the earth has not been idle. Be reminded that spring is the result of winter's work, when sugars that have been storing deep in roots are converted into energy to send those brave shoots to the surface.

Spring is the conversion.

Alan Jones says that it "takes a long time to make a human being, and conversion is that continual process of being made and re-made. In one sense, it is never complete. To be

“When we were initially contacted by Pastor Rae Lynn about co-chairing the Debt Reduction Campaign we were a little apprehensive. We are not experts in debt reduction. Linking Laos and Linworth

On **April 10** the "Linking Laos and Linworth" team will kick off our mission effort with Laos. Linworth's Laos Mission effort is to provide support for the mission efforts already underway. The United Methodist Church's General Board of Global Ministries provides missionaries, pastor training and church support. Our goal is to work in support of these activities.

This effort will ask you to consider three possibilities.

1. Contribute to Laos Church Support. We are asking 24 entities (individuals or groups) to pledge \$100/year for the support of two churches in Laos. Total annual cost of supporting two churches is \$2,400.
2. Contribute to construction of a stairway from the Mekong River to a village in Oudomxay Province. Total cost for one stairway is \$1,500.
3. Consider volunteering for a mission trip to Laos.

In August of 2010 Pastor Rae Lynn challenged us to think of our mission to the neighborhood and to the larger world. She urged us to

engage in her belief that we were called to be in fellowship with the Methodist Church in Laos. She said it was not by accident that we are drawn to Laos. Too many things of coincidence cannot be an accident, but God's hand at work. She is the chair of the Conference Southeast Asia initiative, she has many connections with missionaries in Southeast Asia, she spoke of her association with the Rev. Clint Rabb and of the mission trip in April of 2010.

To explore this calling, she asked the congregation to form a team who could determine what a mission initiative to Laos would look like. In January, 2011 a group began meeting to examine the possibilities. The group asked the missionaries Beverly and Emanuel Barte to identify mission needs of the Methodist Church in Laos. One of our primary concerns was an active engagement, of the congregation not just a small committee, that does its work in an isolated way. So, careful thought was put into communication, trip planning and fund raising to assure engagement.

We have the following recommendations for Laos Projects:

1. Provide \$1,500 each for two congregations in Oudomxay Province for the construction of stairs to climb the cliff from the Mekong River to the villages.
2. Fund the maintenance of two congregations. This would cost about \$1200 each per year.
3. Support the development of the Faith Engine Ministry in Laos. This project would provide technical training, English language training and spiritual guidance to poor rural youth. These young people would graduate in six months with

the ability to repair motorcycles. These marketable skills would enable them to be self-sustaining.

4. Provide scholarships for schooling of poor children.
5. Beginning October 2010 plan two trips per year, one in October and the other in April. Some early projects could include working on schools and libraries.
6. Ask the congregation for prayer support.

human, from the believer's point of view, is to be in a continual process of conversion. To try to approach the fullness of the stature of Christ in one short lifetime seems presumptuous."

Our spiritual lives aren't quite as predictable and patterned as the natural world of seasonal change. The "groundhog" can keep seeing the shadow and a spiritual winter can last longer than we expect. But never think that the winter is idle. Deep below the surface there is life waiting for conversion. Spring will come again.
